

Double Degree Master of Science in Operations Research Columbia University, New York, USA



1. Why did you choose to do a double degree abroad?

I had a multicultural background that I wanted to leverage through an international education and exposure.

2. Why Columbia, USA? How different was the education system?

Columbia is one of the best universities in the world; and Centrale Nantes has a strong relationship and long history with the Engineering School at Columbia University. Centrale Nantes was offering us a unique opportunity that I took.

The education system is very different from Centrale's: It is heavily focused on self-learning and personal efforts. Additionally, the alumni network is key when it comes to job seeking.

4. How much did the degree cost? How did you cope with this expense?

The degree is expensive: it ranges between \$50K and \$70K, depending on time and number of credits.

I had worked before and managed to save some money. The difference is usually paid through loans or family financial support.

5. Do you think it was a fruitful investment?

It was definitely worth it! The Columbia diploma coupled with the French Diplome d'Ingénieur opened a significant number of doors all over the world.

6. What do you do now? What are your plans?

I currently work in healthcare consulting in NYC, as Business Consulting Associate -

ZS Associates. I plan to stay in the service sector for the next couple of years. ZS Associates is a global consulting firm with a focus in healthcare and biotech. We provide our clients with advisory services to guide them in making strategic and operational decisions.

7. Do you think your experience at Columbia University helped you get this position?

It is really challenging, almost impossible to find a job in the US without an American diploma. My Double Diploma was the only reason I could get that job.

8. What would you say to students who are thinking about studying abroad? Any advice?

It is a great opportunity. It's a significant investment and taking a loan might not always be easy/possible. The US is not the only option though, I would definitely recommend an international experience independently of the country you are considering.

I met lifetime friends that come from all over the world. I know I can travel anywhere now and will always be able to reach out to someone from that country — pretty exciting!
